The following statement is made in connection with a claim for benefits in the case of the above-named veteran:

My name is Sgt. Windows Most State 1. I served in the USAF 553 Reconnaissance Wing at the Korat Royal Thai Air Force Base From September 16, 1969 to April 30, 1970 as a Combat Information Monitor in the 553 Recon. Sq. flying on the EC-121R aircraft. I served as an E4 under the direction of Major Glenn Sommers. I flew approximately 80 missions over Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia with Major Sommers. During my assignment at the Royal Thai Air Force Base we spent much our scheduled missions preparing, fueling and waiting on standby on the flight line at as a routine part of our daily assignments. During my assignment at Korat I was a smoker. As such, there were uncountable times that I stood with Major Sommers at the perimeter, in the dirt and away from the airplanes and fuel to smoke waiting as many as 2 hours on standby status to fly.

Major Sommers was very involved with the men he commanded and I spent much time off duty with Major Sommers going to social events as well as being invited to his hutch which was located with all of the officers quarters in close proximity to the perimeter and in the 500ft drift zone of the herbicides used on the base. At the time we were not aware of the 500ft herbicide drift zone. The hutches did not have windows and had outdoor latrines and showers which was a point I often joked about among peers as the enlisted men enjoyed indoor plumbing. It was not common knowledge to me that Agent Orange and other herbicides were used at the perimeter of the base and other areas of the base.
